Thousands of young shooters across the U.S. excelled as the Civilian Marksmanship Program reached out to them with numerous firearm safety and marksmanship clinics, camps and competitions. The National

Junior ROTC three-position air rifle season kicked off in the fall of 2010 with postal matches and concluded in March 2011 at the National Championships at the CMP Marksmanship Center in Anniston, Alabama. Individual champion Connor Davis, 18, of Kentucky set two new national Marine Corps Junior ROTC precision air rifle records and led his Shelby County High School team to a national title in precision air rifle.

Army JROTC sporter air rifle competitor Mikaelah Atchley of Alabama emerged with a championship in a spirited final and tied a national Army JROTC record. Juniors flocked to a series of CMP summer air rifle camps held at Anniston, Camp Perry and several Western outreach clinics with an average attendance of 60 shooters.

At the 2011 National Matches, several juniors fared well including Joseph Totts of Ohio who won the National Trophy Individual Pistol Junior Match and teamed up with Ryan Nichols to win the National Trophy Pistol Junior Team Match. Steven Hall of New York won overall in the *AiR-15 Challenge*. Jacob Guay was successful as high junior and high 4-H shooter in the Rimfire Sporter Match T-class. Tyler Rico was the high overall junior highpower service rifle champion.

Ceremonial Rifle Program

CMP proudly supports the U.S. Army's TACOM Life Cycle Management Command's Static Display and Ceremonial Rifle program by servicing and shipping M1 Garand rifles to eligible organizations for ceremonial purposes, at no cost to the government. In FY11, CMP has shipped over 5,000 rifles.

CMP armorers inspect, repair, test fire, install blank firing adapters and ship ceremonial M1 Garand rifles to TACOM at no charge. The CMP has been providing volunteers to inspect and repair ceremonial rifles

at veteran organizations since 2003.



CMP Games Events

CMP now offers nine CMP Games matches which allow shooters to reenact military and marksmanship history and feature camaraderie in a relaxed, fun-filled, yet challenging experience.

The newest match, the Vintage Sniper Rifle Team Match, allows competitors to use scoped rifles and brings shooters back into the sport who had quit



competing because of failing eyesight. The match also provides shooters a format to shoot Korean War, World War II or earlier as-issued military sniper rifles or replicas of those rifles.

CMP Social Media

The CMP actively engages and communicates with customers and participants through several social media. The CMP has active Facebook and Twitter accounts along with a CMP Forum where individuals can ask questions and post comments. The CMP recently upgraded its E-commerce site to provide an easy, user-friendly experience.

Chairman/CEO's Message:

The Board of Directors and Officers of the Corporation for the Promotion of Rifle Practice and Firearms Safety, Inc., popularly known as the Civilian Marksmanship Program or CMP, are pleased to present this **CMP 2011 Annual Report**.

In presenting this report, the CMP certifies that it has complied with all applicable provisions in its federal enabling legislation in Title 36 USC, §40701-40733.

The 1996 law that established the CMP as a federally-chartered, not-for-profit corporation gives the CMP authority to sell surplus government rifles to support the marksmanship and firearm safety training and competition programs that the CMP carries out in fulfillment of its statutory mission. Funding for CMP programs comes primarily from the sale of these surplus rifles that are drawn from the U. S. Army. The CMP continues to enjoy full cooperation and support from the Army in its sales and program endeavors.

During FY11, proceeds from the sale of government surplus rifles fully funded all CMP programs and provided a substantial surplus of revenue over expenses for the tenth consecutive year and were invested in the CMP's permanent endowment fund. This fund will be available to continue to finance CMP programs in future years after the supply of government surplus rifles is exhausted.

During the past fiscal year, the CMP not only provided an expanding array of firearm safety and marksmanship programs for U. S. citizens, but it continued to support several Armed Services marksmanship training activities with staff and volunteer expertise, as well as funding. CMP support for these programs included direct support for Army, Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force JROTC programs and for a series of U. S. Army marksmanship instructor training and competition activities.

Fiscal Year 2011 was our 15th year of success, growth and improvement for the Corporation. We trust that our past year's accomplishments are reflected in the data, records and illustrations in our **CMP 2011 Annual Report**.

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CIVILIAN MARKSMANSHIP PROGRAM

CMP History

The Civilian Marksmanship Program traces its origin to 1903 when Congress and the President established the National Matches and National Board for the Promotion of Rifle Practice. The program gave life to a concept advanced by President Theodore Roosevelt and several other national leaders that marksmanship skills developed through regular practice and competition contribute to the nation's defense.



When the program expanded to make its competitions and military support available to civilians, it became identified as the "civilian marksmanship program." When U. S. Army interest in marksmanship diminished after WWII,

the CMP mission increasingly focused on fostering youth development through marksmanship. Then in 1996, after 93 years of Department of Defense and U. S. Army administration, Congress privatized the program by creating a federally chartered, not-for-profit corporation known as the Corporation for the Promotion of Rifle Practice and Firearm Safety, Inc.



Today, the program is popularly recognized as the Civilian Marksmanship Program or CMP. The marksmanship heritage inherited by the CMP in 1996 included the National Matches, Small Arms Firing Schools, and a network of affiliated state associations and clubs. The 1996 legislation (36 USC §40701-40733) states, in part, that the functions of the CMP are 1) *to instruct citizens of the United States in marksmanship*, 2) *to promote practice and safety in*

the use of firearms and 3) to conduct competitions in the use of firearms.

The law goes on to state that *"in carrying out the Civilian Marksmanship Program, the corporation shall give priority to activities that benefit firearms safety, training, and competition for youth and that reach as many youth participants as possible."*

A National Leader in Firearm Safety and Marksmanship

Since 1996, the new CMP built upon its marksmanship heritage to become a national leader in firearms safety and marksmanship training and competition. In the 15 years since the CMP became a non-profit corporation, its board of directors, administrative officers and staff have launched numerous safety, marksmanship training and competition programs that fulfill the corporation's statutory mission.





The CMP has become a national leader by emphasizing safety and basic marksmanship instruction, mass participation in its competitions, applying technological innovation and providing outstanding constituent service. This **CMP 2011 Annual Report** provides summary data on CMP programs and activities that took place in FY11.

Revenue Generation

During FY11, proceeds from the sale of surplus rifles fully funded all CMP programs and provided a substantial surplus of revenue over expenses for the endowment fund.



The CMP operates retail stores in Anniston, Alabama and at Camp Perry, Ohio in addition to its internet E-store and Auction.

CMP SALES

CMP operations, warehousing, inspection & repair, test firing, sales order processing and distribution activities are headquartered in Anniston, Alabama.

The CMP operates two successful retail stores that are popular destinations for CMP customers. The first CMP Store opened at Camp Perry, Ohio, in April 2002. The second opened in Anniston, Alabama, in June 2006. Both stores give CMP customers opportunities to personally inspect government surplus rifles before making



purchases. The stores now account for about 25% of all CMP sales revenue. The CMP also conducts on-site sales at the CMP Eastern Games in Camp Butner, North Carolina, the CMP Western Games in Phoenix, Arizona, and occasionally at other events.

Individuals who wish to purchase government-surplus rifles from the CMP must be members of a CMP-affiliated organization.

ENDOWMENT FUND

The CMP is committed to providing its safety, education and competition programs well into the future.

The federal law that established the new CMP authorizes the Corporation to sell surplus .30 and

.22 caliber military rifles, parts and ammunition to qualified U.S. citizens "for marksmanship." Accordingly, the CMP sells government-surplus M1 Garands, M1 Carbines, .22 caliber target rifles and small quantities of other rifles to qualified purchasers. Net revenue from CMP sales is used to fund operations and programs and to supplement the endowment.

The Corporation recognizes that its primary source of income, the sale of surplus government rifles, will not be available indefinitely. To assure that CMP programs have a stable funding source in the future, the Board of Directors established a permanent endowment fund in 1999.

All funds generated from CMP sales that are surplus to requirements for current operations are transferred to this fund. Professional investment advisory firms operating under the supervision of the Board of Directors' Investment Committee manage endowment fund investment accounts.

ANNUAL FINANCIAL AUDIT

An independent accounting firm performs annual audits of CMP financial statements and operations. The FY11 CMP audit did not report any irregularities in financial statements or operations.

the CMP maintains close and supportive working relationships with many Department of Defense organizations. As a result, a considerable portion of the CMP budget is expended on programs that directly benefit the marksmanship training and competition programs of the U. S. Armed Services.

This support for Armed Services agencies is provided at no cost to the government. Examples of these programs are the CMP's support of Army, Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force JROTC marksmanship, ceremonial rifle repair for veterans' organizations, scholarships for ROTC cadets and contributions to upgrade infrastructure at Camp Perry, the Ohio Army National Guard post where CMP program staff is based.

MARKSMANSHIP TRAINING AND COMPETITION PROGRAM SUMMARIES

During FY11, CMP training and competition programs served a growing population of youth and adults. This section of the CMP Annual Report provides summary data about those programs.

National Matches

The National Matches were established by an Act of Congress in 1903; the CMP plays a leading role in the preservation and expansion of the Matches that take place every year at Camp Perry, Ohio. The matches have been held at Camp Perry for more than 100 years.



This year's participation was the highest ever for CMP phases of the National Matches with 5,425 students in the various schools and individual competitors. CMP National Matches events offer national championship competition in service rifle and service pistol, as well as national level competitions with rimfire sporter smallbore rifles, as-issued military rifles, and air pistols and rifles. Several clinics and camps are also offered during the CMP National Matches.



The Ohio Army National Guard's Camp Perry Training Site, six miles west of Port Clinton, Ohio has served as the home of the National Matches since 1907 and is the headquarters of the CMP's marksmanship programs. CMP works closely with the OHNG and the NRA in conducting the National Matches annually.

Gun Safety Programs

The CMP believes that gun safety training is the foremost means of ensuring the safe and responsible use of firearms and airguns. Every



CMP program has a safety component that includes safety doctrine, safety training and safety controls. Every CMP training course includes a gun safety presentation. The use of gun safety flags is mandatory in all CMP events. Rifle purchasers must show proof of marksmanship activity where safety training was given. Gun safety locks are available for all rifles sold by the CMP.



Small Arms Firing Schools

Participation in the 2011 school included 1,170 students who received introductory safety and marksmanship instruction in the 2011 Pistol and Rifle Schools at Camp Perry. Students learn from the most accomplished military instructors and competitors in the nation.

Sanctioned Competitions

The CMP sanctioned more than 1,470 matches for approximately 15,000 competitors in 2011. The CMP's sanctioned match program offers competitions in Excellence-In-Competition (EIC), John C. Garand, Springfield, Vintage Military Rifle,



Carbine, Rimfire Sporter, Three-Position Air Rifle and National Match Air Rifle events.

Marksmanship Clinics

Eight hundred fifty juniors and adults received expert instruction by CMP certified volunteers at 20 special clinics this year. CMP affiliated clubs have conducted 100 marksmanship clinics and trained an estimated 2,000 new shooters in 2011. The CMP has now trained 458 Master Instructors, including 52 in FY11, who serve as rifle clinic instructors in their home clubs. The CMP provides training curriculum for use in these clinics.

Three-Position Air Rifle Junior Competitions

Air rifle target shooting is now the most popular youth shooting sports competition activity in the U.S.

In addition to sanctioning 150 state and regional competitions for 6,500 junior competitors, the CMP supported nine major national junior competitions in 2011 in cooperation



with the American Legion; Army, Marine Corps, Navy and Air Force JROTC Commands; Daisy/U.S. Jaycee Shooter Education Program; the U. S.

Army; and USA Shooting Junior Olympics (sporter and precision).

Competition Tracker

The CMP is a world leader in using computer technology to manage competition events and provide live results to the shooting sports public via the Internet. In FY11, the CMP Competition Tracker results page received 412,000 visitors and over 4.5 million pageviews.

State Directors

CMP-appointed State Directors coordinate the delivery of CMP youth programs in their states. There are 56 Directors serving in 44 states (some states have more than one director).

JROTC Marksmanship Training

The CMP is responsible for training JROTC instructors and certifying JROTC ranges. Thirty-three JROTC Marksmanship Instruction Course (JMIC) Master Instructors were either trained or recertified in FY11. Since 2005, the CMP has trained 362 JMIC Master Instructors. JMIC Master Instructors have now trained 6,062 JROTC instructors to teach gun safety and air rifle marksmanship to cadets in their JROTC units.

JROTC Competitions

The CMP cooperated with the Army, Navy, Marine and Air Force Cadet Commands to conduct JROTC postal, regional and national marksmanship competitions. During the 2010-2011 school year 6,769 cadets participated in these competitions.

Scholarships

The CMP awarded 150 \$1,000 higher education scholarships to qualified students who also

participate in marksmanship activities for the upcoming academic year. The CMP recently expanded its scholarship program budget from \$100,000 to \$150,000.

4-H Shooting Sports State Grants

The CMP now awards \$200 4-H Shooting Sports State Grants. In FY11, 43 states were award grants.

Camp Riflery Instructors

Over 150 camp riflery instructors who were trained by CMP Master Instructors taught gun safety and rifle marksmanship to an estimated 16,000 youth during the 2011 summer camp season.



Junior Rifle Camps

The CMP junior air rifle camp staff, comprised of U. S. Olympians and leading collegiate shooters, conducted nine summer sports camps that taught advanced rifle marksmanship skills to 466 school-age youth who were accompanied by 183 adult leaders. Two CMP junior highpower service rifle camps staffed by the Marine Corps Rifle Team at Camp Perry, Ohio and Camp Butner, North Carolina taught advanced service rifle skills to 253 juniors.



Affiliated Clubs

There are **4,806** clubs, schools, teams and other shooting sports organizations currently affiliated with the CMP. Clinics and instruction offered by affiliated clubs are important ways for the CMP to deliver gun safety and marksmanship programs to U. S. citizens.

Indoor Marksmanship Centers

The CMP has established two 80 point indoor air gun ranges equipped with state-of-the-art electronic targets and results display systems at Camp Perry, Ohio, and Anniston, Alabama. The CMP Camp Perry Marksmanship Center hosted 8,387 users and 6,055 competitors in 116 single or multi-day training or competition events. The Anniston Marksmanship Center hosted 7,548 users and 5,749 competitors in 137 single or multi-day training or competition events.



Air gun competitors have an opportunity to use the CMP Marksmanship Centers during Open Public Shooting two times a week along with various monthly matches held at the centers. Both centers are equipped with electronic targets which provide instant feedback.

Training Materials

A major part of the CMP's educational effort is the design, production and distribution of training materials that are available in print or DVD formats or as on-line downloads through the CMP website. This year's distributions included 500,000 printed training and program items plus several hundred DVDs and on-line downloads.

On The Mark

The CMP published and distributed four issues of its quarterly magazine for youth shooting sports

leaders and JROTC instructors. Mail circulation for *On The Mark*, the nation's preeminent juniors shooting publication, grew from 9,186 to 9,958 this year. An additional 8,110 issues of *On the Mark* were downloaded from the CMP website.



The First Shot On-Line

The CMP posted 65 new feature articles and provided periodic (usually bi-weekly) issues of this electronic on-line newsletter to 71,763 email subscribers. Electronic communications are the CMP's primary means of communication with program participants.

The federal law that established the CMP gives it statutory authority to conduct competitions and award prizes. To fulfill that mission, the CMP conducts national, regional and sanctioned competitions. CMP competitions and the numbers of participants in each in 2011 were:

- National Matches with Service Pistol, Service Rifle, Rimfire Sporter and Air Gun events: 5,400 competitors.
- Eastern and Western CMP Games with As-Issued Military Rifle events: 1,200 competitors.
- JROTC Air Rifle Championships with Postal, Service and National Championship events: 7,800 competitors.
- National Three-Position Air Rifle Council sanctioned competitions: 6,000 competitors.
- U. S. Army, U. S. Marine Corps and Interservice rifle and pistol competitions: 225 competitors.
- CMP Sanctioned Matches for Service Rifle and Pistol, As-Issued Military Rifles, Rimfire Sporter and 3-Position Air Rifle: 14,500 competitors.
